

The Honolulu Police Commission is made up of seven members who are appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. All members serve staggered terms of five years. They volunteer their services and do not receive any compensation.

A chair and vice-chair are elected from within its membership every year. The commission chair for 2023 was Mr. Doug Chin and Mr. Kenneth Silva served as vice-chair.

The commission has the following mandated responsibilities:

- · Appoints and may remove the Chief of Police;
- Evaluates the performance of the Chief of Police at least annually;
- · Reviews rules and regulations for the administration of the Honolulu Police Department;
- Reviews the annual budget prepared by the Chief of Police and may make recommendations thereon to the Mayor;
- · Compares at least annually the actual achievements of the police department with the goals and objectives in the five-year plan; and
- · Receives, considers, and investigates charges brought by the public against the conduct of the department or any of its members and submits a written report of its findings to the Chief of Police.



MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE



Aloha,

A year of noteworthy initiatives to enhance police services also witnessed a somber reminder that every day officers don their badges, pledging the full measure of themselves for the protection of others. Our very own Officer Bill Sapolu was lost on August 8, 2023, after sustaining injuries in the performance of his of duties. The department's accomplishments this past year reflect our unwavering effort to honor the selfless devotion of Officer Sapolu and all of "Honolulu's Finest."

A modified work schedule was implemented in all patrol districts to provide improved overall police coverage and response for communities across Oahu. With the new

schedule, patrol officers worked 13 or 13–1/2 hours a day for fewer days a week. While the longer hours can be are taxing, guidelines and rules were put into place for officers' health and well-being. We hope that the additional days off will provide more time for officers to spend with their families and pursue personal interests, better balancing their professional and personal lives.

In 2023, the department committed to upgrading the issued pistol for all officers with cutting edge handgun technology. The new pistols will be equipped with a red dot optic sight and an integrated flashlight to promote a safer, more favorable outcome for officers and the public.

Information Technology Division personnel played a major role in the data preparation for the department's new, public dashboard beta test. Everyone can access the dashboard on our website to view for timely and/or historical police-related information, including crime statistics, crime mapping, and vehicle collision information.

Everyone in our department, from clerks to executive officers, made each accomplishment possible, contributing their best for a better quality of life on Oahu. Equally valuable is the public's interest and investment in this common goal. Being a part of such devoted efforts, I am truly proud, inspired, and ever grateful.



IN MEMORIAM

OFFICER BILL SAPOLU



MARCH 31, 1977 - AUGUST 8, 2023

On July 11, 2023, while responding to assist a fellow officer on a weapons violation call, Officer Bill Sapolu's motorcycle struck a concrete median. He was thrown from his motorcycle and sustained serious injuries. Officer Sapolu succumbed to those injuries on August 8, 2023.

In addition to 20 years of service with the Honolulu Police Department, Officer Sapolu was a 22-year combat veteran with Hawaii Army National Guard. He is survived by his wife and three children.

IN MEMORIAM

LEE D. DONOHUE SR.



In 1964, Lee D. Donohue Sr. began his career of public service with the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), and ascending through every rank, he became the department's eighth chief of police in 1998. Chief Donohue is credited with guiding the department into the 21st century. Under his administration, the HPD was awarded national accreditation, updated its telecommunications system, and expanded community policing. Officers and the public, then and now, have Chief

Donohue to thank for acquiring life-saving equipment such as bullet-resistant vests and automated external defibrillators.

In the wake of the 9/11 attacks, the nation experienced a ripple effect of anxiety, fear, and anger. While facing anti-terrorism and national security challenges, Chief Donohue provided a calm, steady hand with his leadership to maintain positive relations between law enforcement and the community.

At a time when police departments across the country struggled with personnel shortages, Chief Donohue's efforts in recruiting and retaining officers resulted in an unprecedented reduction in officer vacancies.

Chief Donohue worked with thousands of at-risk youths through Kick Start Karate, an organization that he co-founded to teach martial arts and life skills. He also led efforts to establish the Honolulu Police Community Foundation to promote positive community-police relations and provide financial support to the HPD.

We bid farewell to Chief Donohue on July 9, 2023. He will be dearly missed and remembered by all those whose lives he touched both personally and professionally. As for his HPD family, there is no greater expression of respect and admiration than the countless officers who called him "a cop's cop."

POWERS, DUTIES, AND FUNCTIONS


The Honolulu Police Department serves as the primary law enforcement agency for the entire island of Oahu.

The Chief of Police directs the operation and administration of the department and is responsible for the following:


- preservation of the public peace;
- protection of the rights of persons and property;
- prevention of crime;
- detection and arrest of offenders against the law;
- enforcement and prevention of violations of state laws and city ordinances; and
- service of processes and notices in civil and criminal proceedings.

The department's jurisdiction is the City and County of Honolulu. It includes the entire island of Oahu, which has a circumference of about 137 miles and an area of approximately 596 square miles. The estimated resident population is 996,300, which includes military personnel but not tourists.

For police operations, the island is divided into eight patrol districts; each district is subdivided into sectors and beats. The department's headquarters is at 801 South Beretania Street in downtown Honolulu. District stations are found in Kalihi, Kaneohe, Kapolei, Pearl City, Wahiawa, and Waianae.



HONOLULU POLICE DEPARTMENT **DISTRICT MAP OF OAHU**



Lab Coat Detectives

Fingerprints are invaluable evidence that can implicate or rule out suspects, or in the absence of a suspect, provide potential leads through local and national databases.

In 2023, the Scientific Investigation Section (SIS) completed its inaugural year of the newly established Latent Print Unit. This unit employs state-of-the-art physical, chemical, and lighting techniques to maximize latent print recovery. Staffing this unit tripled the number of fingerprint evidence examiners, significantly improving the efficiency of crime-solving efforts. The Latent Print Unit's highly trained and skilled personnel are indispensable assets for helping victims of crime and contributing to the service of justice to our community.

Methamphetamine Purity Testing



Accreditation in the area of methamphetamine purity testing obtained by the SIS this year added to the department's arsenal in the fight against drug-related crimes. This international credential is an integral component for federal prosecutions because individuals possessing highly

pure methamphetamine can receive longer prison sentences. In 2023, the SIS provided purity testing assistance for a federal seizure of 300 pounds of methamphetamine with an estimated street value of \$11,000,000.

Honolulu Police Department Mobile Wellness Application

In October 2023, the Community Affairs Division fulfilled one of the department's strategies of promoting employee wellness and mental health by introducing the mobile Cordico App and making it available to all HPD employees, their significant others, and retirees.

The application is a free 24/7 wellness resource that is confidential and anonymous and provides selfassessments and one-touch dialing for peer support, chaplains, and therapists. It also provides over 50 behavioral health topics on wellness, including videos and articles on fitness, nutrition, finances, substance abuse, marriage, family support, compassion fatigue, and emotional survival. As a security measure, downloading the application requires a departmental identification login and code but no personal information.

Overall, the application provides a valuable tool to support various aspects of employees' physical and mental health, particularly in dealing with the challenges of a high-stress profession like law enforcement.

In three months, 226 employees had logged in and over 500 new active sessions for various help programs were

Cracking Down: Multiple Robberies, **Multiple Arrests**

In 2023, the Robbery Detail investigated six separate robbery series that involved two or more robberies committed by the same suspects. These investigations led to arrests and charges of numerous individuals. The following are just two examples of successes that resulted from the fine work of detectives in the detail.

On June 20, 2023, the 7-Eleven store in Aiea and Kahaluu were both robbed at gunpoint by the same person. The suspect was identified, located, and arrested. The suspect was charged with multiple counts of Robbery in the First Degree.

Between April 25 and May 16, 2023, two robberies occurred at the 24 Hour Vapes store and an additional two robberies occurred at a nearby Wendy's restaurant. All four robberies were committed by one suspect who was successfully apprehended, arrested, and charged for the multiple robbery offenses.

Well-Deserved Recognition

District 4 was especially proud of two of its own who received awards in 2023 for their remarkable achievements, contributions, and strong commitment to the safety and well-being of our community.

Sergeant Casey Kailihiwa received the HPD's 2023 Sergeant of the Year award. As a supervisor for the district's Crime Reduction Unit, his team made 91 arrests and investigated and charged 27 felony cases that included auto thefts, prolific property crimes, robberies, kidnapping, and firearm weapon offenses.

Officer Jarret Atkins of the Community Policing Team was awarded as the HPD's 2023 Officer of the Year for his outstanding service as a model for modern, proactive community policing. He established partnerships and forged lasting, trusting relationships with members of all five neighborhood boards in District 4. He arrested 90 individuals on 145 separate criminal charges, which included felony drug cases, burglary, auto theft, unauthorized entry into motor vehicles, and fireworks offenses.

Odyssey Rope Challenge Course and Scaventour Hawaii

The District 1 Community Policing Team (CPT) demonstrated its commitment to youth development through three Youth Mentorship events. Through these events, 17 enthusiastic youths engaged in the challenging yet rewarding Odyssey Ropes Course and Alpine Tower and honed their teamwork, problemsolving, and leadership skills. Additionally, the CPT collaborated with Scaventour Hawaii and organized two mentoring

events for 100 youths from District 1 and the Honolulu Police Department's (HPD) Law Enforcement Explorers Program.

Officers played a pivotal role as mentors in these activities. They facilitated conversations and interactions to empower youths, boost their confidence, and enhance their self-awareness while tackling obstacles and completing tasks.









A Promising Future

The Law and Justice Pathway pilot program, initiated in the fall semester of 2023, has seen great success. The District 2 Community Policing Team (CPT) and Mililani High School created this program for students who are interested in local law and police/community relations. As a part of the program, two Foundations of Law class sessions were facilitated eight times a month by the district's CPT. Students were introduced to the

Hawaii Revised Statutes and took on the role of officers in different scenarios that included learning call signs, crime scene processing, traffic stop etiquette, etc.

As a result, several students have expressed an interest in applying for the HPD after completing their education. Also, some attitudes were changed to a positive outlook toward the department after interacting with the officers.



Creating Safer Communities

The District 3 Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) has helped decrease crime through impactful arrests and community engagement. By the first half of 2023, the unit took on 973 cases, issued 324 citations, and made 289 arrests. Their diligence and proactive efforts contributed to a decrease in crime in the Waipahu,

Pearl City, Aiea, and Aliamanu areas. Estimates indicated that crimes in three categories decreased; burglary by 40 percent, robbery by 22 percent, and auto theft by 31 percent.


Another major success for the CRU was reclaiming the once crime-ridden Pearl Harbor Bike Path by collaborating with other city agencies and community groups on cleanup efforts and enforcement. The unit's relentless dedication has delivered tangible reductions in key crimes plaguing the community.




Enhancing Employees' Well-Being

In support of the HPD's Strategic Plan, the District 3 leadership team (i.e., the major, captain, and lieutenants) set a goal in 2023 to improve internal communication and create an open and transparent environment by meeting with Day and Night Watch officers as a team united. During these meetings, various work- and nonwork-related topics were discussed in an effort to increase interaction and build trust throughout the district.









Safety Initiatives

Central Recieving Division (CRD) initiatives in 2023 focused on enhancing safety for officers and detainees and increasing efficiency in the division's work with patrol elements, outside agencies, and the community.

In April 2023, a full-body scanner was delivered and installed at the CRD. The scanner uses millimeter radio wave imaging technology for the detection of concealed metallic/ nonmetallic weapons, improvised explosive devices, liquids, and narcotics. Furthermore, the scanner improved safety protocols by reducing contact time to process a detainee in the cell block. The scanner was put to good use by screening approximately 5,670 detainees by the year's end.



Processing Arrestees

During calendar year 2023, CRD personnel processed 16,093 adults and 146 juvenile arrestees and transported approximately 7,616 arrestees to the Sheriff Division's court detention facilities. In addition, throughout the same period, CRD personnel made 415 arrests and initiated about 1,800 police incident reports.

Everything, Everywhere, All at Once

As the computerization of departmental operations is now ubiquitous, the commensurate need for technical support has called on the Information Technology Division (ITD) to be practically everything, everywhere, all at once. For example, the division replaced 90 mobile data computers (MDC) and installed 50 new MDC docking stations for the Criminal Investigation Division, upgraded report writing computers at nearly all district stations, and helped acquire and install equipment for new camera systems for two patrol districts. While such element-specific projects were being fulfilled, the responsive MDC team assisted countless individuals in 2023 by servicing an average of 100 help desk calls a day, as well as 5 to 10 calls after hours.



Alternative Devices: Options and Flexibility

When more employees began working from home, the challenge of providing more portable computer equipment that was already in short supply fell on the ITD. In 2023, the ITD successfully tested alternative devices from Samsung, Microsoft, and Dell.

The Court of Great Appeal



The Late Night Basketball Program is held in the summertime and gives at-risk youths various positive activities as an alternative to pursuing mischief or untoward behavior. The program was held in June and July of 2023 at the Palama Settlement Gym and was very successful with over 100 at-risk juveniles who participated in the three-part mentoring program. Besides basketball, the players were required to attend an educational class and participate in sign waving with positive messages for their community.

The partnerships for this year's Late Night Basketball Program included District 5 CPT officers, Weed and Seed Hawaii, the Palama Settlement, YMCA Kalihi Branch, Susannah Wesley Community Center, Kökua Kalihi Valley, and Pacific Voices.


Community Trust, Community Improvement



Homelessness is a complex, islandwide challenge. District 4 has its fair share of issues related to homelessness that range from crimes like harassment, drugs, and illegal camps to quality of life issues for adjacent communities.

In response to these issues, the district's support staff, along with the City and County of Honolulu's

Department of Facility Maintenance, successfully conducted a number of shoreline clean-up operations in an effort to keep our communities safe and clean.



Replacement Pistol Evaluation

In April 2023, field testing began on two new pistols to find a possible replacement for the officers' issued, patrol duty weapon: the Glock 47 and Sig Sauer P320 pistols. Both weapons were also tested with a pistol-mounted, red dot optic sight and weapon-mounted flashlight that are designed to improve accuracy in high-stress situations. Over a 90-day period, patrol officers and officers of the Traffic and Specialized Services Divisions carried and evaluated each pistol.



Operation Trident

On July 27, 2023, the Narcotics/Vice Division's (NVD) Gambling Detail, assisted by the Specialized Services Division (SSD), Crime Reduction Units (CRU) from four districts, and several other elements, executed three search warrants simultaneously for the Operation Trident initiative. Operation Trident addressed multiple gambling complaints in the District 5 area. With the successful execution of the warrants and their respective investigations, a total of 45 illegal gambling devices with an estimated value of \$405,000 and \$12,700 in cash were seized.


Making Roadways Safer

Impaired driving, speeding, and distracted driving are the main contributors to critical and fatal collisions. Focusing on these factors by reviewing collision data from the Records Management System, enforcement and officer visibility were increased at hot spots that were indicated by the information. This proactive effort resulted in 39,573 citations and 723 Operating a Vehicle Under the Influence of an Intoxicant (OVUII) arrests, with 597 of those arrested being charged.

The Traffic Division also saw a decrease in felony-related OVUII cases with 40 in 2023 in comparison to 42 in 2022, with 8 cases being charged in comparison to 15 cases being charged in 2022.

Of the 57 traffic fatalities, 32 involved speeding as a contributing factor. There was also an increase of 19 motorcyclerelated fatalities in comparison to 10 the previous year.

In 2023, the division issued approximately 16,696 citations for various speed-related offenses and 31,927 citations for other traffic violations.



Aircraft Disaster Response Training

On October 20, 2023, Major Events Division (MED) and District 5 personnel participated in a full-scale aircraft disaster exercise at the Daniel K. Inouve International Airport. This exercise brought together several government agencies, medical and academic institutions, and private stakeholders. The simulation involved a mass casualty event triggered by a cargo plane incident on the airport ramp. The primary objective of this exercise was to assess the interoperability of the emergency management system in a high-stress environment and evaluate mobilization and response capabilities.



Upgrading Communications' **Alternate Site**

The upgrading of the alternate communications center, which will be a backup site for the Communications Division, was near completion by the end of 2023. These upgrades included replacing outdated computer equipment, installing new furniture, and rearranging the layout to maximize efficiency in a smaller area than the current communications operation center.

HPD Officers in Red, White...and Blue

At Christmas time, youngsters throughout the island saw their patrol officers in red and white as well as blue. Patrol districts' Community Policing Teams (CPT) worked with various organizations to celebrate the holiday season with a day of fun and gifts.

Through the Shop with a Hero event, a collaboration with Hawaii USA Federal Credit Union and Weed & Seed Hawaii, the District 1 CPT brightened the holiday season for 35 students and fostered positive connections

between youths and local heroes in law enforcement and the military. The opportunity for photographs with Father Christmas added a touch of festive magic, creating lasting memories of camaraderie and holiday spirit.

Christmas gifts were also personally delivered to community members in Kukui Gardens and Kekaulike Courtyard, showcasing the CPT's commitment to reaching out to those in need and cultivating stronger community relations.

District 8's Community Policing Team, working with Weed & Seed Hawaii, the Boys and Girls Clubs of Hawaii, the Rotary Club, McDonalds, and Walmart, brought smiles to students of multiple schools in the district. These students had the opportunity to shop for Christmas presents alongside first responders with funds donated by the partners of this event. This event helped to build relationships within the community and make a child's favorite time of year even brighter.



Mentorship and **Guidance Pilot Program**

In 2023, an emphasis on recruit mentoring and guidance was implemented into each recruit class as part of the training curriculum. Class staff were assigned to recruits as mentors and met weekly with their assigned recruits. Recruits received individual guidance to help better adjust to the stresses and demands of academy life and feel a greater sense of personal investment from Training Division staff. Recruits were offered support for professional pursuits and for their personal lives as well. Several recruit classes spoke of how the staff felt more like family than drill instructors.

With the 208th Recruit Class, a pilot project was also implemented wherein commanders further assisted the class in a mentorship program, including mentorship sessions and physical training with the recruit class.



The final 209th Recruit Class at the end of 2023. It started with 22 recruits and graduated with 20, for an impressive 91 percent graduation rate.

From the Top

In its continuing effort to avail pertinent and timely information to the public, the HPD added to the numerous, accessible quick links to police-related information that are already posted on the HPD's public website.

Current Calls for Police Service is the label for a quick link to an up-to-date list of all active police calls for service on Oahu. While the information is preliminary, it lists the date and time of each call, incident type, and location, all of which are updated every 15 minutes.


HPD Data Dashboard is the label for another quick link to numerous types of data such as violent crimes, motor vehicle collisions, use of force, and officer-involved shootings. All but one of these types of data can be compared by month and several previous years.



Honolulu Rail Emergency Response Training

In collaboration with Hitachi Rail Honolulu (HRH) and the Honolulu Fire Department, the MED conducted several, extensive rail-related training for departmental personnel throughout 2023. On October 30, 2023, trainees participated in a full-scale exercise of a simulated fire at the Hitachi Rail Yard; specifically, a rail car fire scenario. Trainees also participated in a tabletop exercise in

December for an active threat situation at the Aloha Stadium Rail Station that involved several organizations such as HRH staff, K&J Safety and Security Consulting, Inc., as well as other city agencies.

Cybercrimes Detail

In 2023, the Cybercrimes Detail handled 1,270 cybercrime cases and completed 291 digital forensic examinations. Among these investigations were several high-profile cases. For example, there was an Attempted Murder in the Second Degree case in which the suspect attempted to shoot his ex-girlfriend and then threw acid on her. Contrary to the the suspect's claim, the detail was able to perform an examination of his telephone to prove that he was in fact in the area of the incident when it occurred. The suspect was charged and a bail was set at \$2,000,000.

In November of 2023, Acting Lieutenant Thomas linuma, who led the detail throughout the year, was nominated for an award by the U.S. Secret Service for having ranked amongst the top 100 examiners in the United States for the number of digital forensic examinations completed. Acting Lieutenant linuma will receive the award at a ceremony in early 2024.

Emergency Response Vehicle

District 7 started the Emergency Response Vehicle (ERV) pilot project that took a standard fleet sport utility vehicle and outfitted it with supplemental equipment that is not kept in standard patrol vehicles. With the ERV in the field on each watch, specialty equipment (e.g., ballistic shields, ballistic helmets, and rifles with optics) reached officers faster than previously in active threat and other dynamic events. Reducing delays in any way favors a successful outcome in critical situations that require immediate response.

As a part of the ERV pilot program, officers received extensive training in accessing and using the high-risk equipment with efficiency as well as simulated scenario training for dynamic, high-threat incidents.






We Let the Dogs Out!



Major Roger Izumigawa retired from the Honolulu Police Department (HPD) in 1994 after 32 years of service. He worked in various divisions throughout those years, but it was his tenure as the Communications Division's major where his expertise and leadership precipitated an enduring, significant contribution to public safety. Major Izumigawa developed and facilitated several multimillion dollar projects, including the department's first islandwide public safety telecommunications infrastructure as well as the Computer Aided Dispatch, and Enhanced 911 systems.

Major Izumigawa's foresight embraced technological developments that forever transformed how the HPD and other emergency services operated. His leadership and efforts had a positive ripple effect on policing. The new systems resulted in quicker response times and improved safety for police officers and the community.



STATISTICS 2023

Violent and property crimes are categorized into seven serious offenses called index crimes, which are used to define trends over time and make comparisons across the nation. The statistics for index crimes are prepared and submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program on a regular basis. Index crimes consist of four types of violent crimes (murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) and three types of property crimes (burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft).

Murder and murder-related counts in Tables 1, 2, and 5 were obtained from the Honolulu Police Department's (HPD) Homicide Detail, Criminal Investigation Division. Traffic fatality numbers were provided by the Traffic Division.

All count data, except for Curfew and Runaway in Table 4, were obtained from our department's Case Report System (CRS) and converted from the National Incident-Based Report System to the Summary Reporting System.

In 2023, the HPD's CRS was used to prepare the following 2023 tabular count data:

- · All index and non-index crime data except Murder;
- · Weapon type used in Robbery and Aggravated Assault;
- · Adult and Juvenile Arrests; and
- · District and Beat Offenses.

INDEX CRIME DEFINITIONS

Index crime definitions from the FBI's UCR, Summary Reporting System Manual 1.0, are listed below:

MURDER

The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

FORCIBLE RAPE

Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

ROBBERY

The taking or attempted taking of anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

BURGLARY

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

LARCENY-THEFT

The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.




